
The Parish of Tilehurst St Catherine and Calcot St Birinus

Phew!! With God's help we got through 2023 together!

2023 has been for us a year to remember – for many reasons! Gill Rowell when she left us on 30th November 2022 gave us the words from Philippians 4: Keep on doing the things that you have learnt and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you. And as we have journeyed through 2023 and all it has brought us, that has been what all of us have sought to do.

WORKING TOWARDS A FUTURE WITH A VICAR

A dominant activity throughout 2023 was the search to identify God's chosen person for our vacant post of vicar. God has been faithful, and our vacancy ended just 2 days short of a year, when Jackie Fountain was instituted and inducted as our vicar on 28th November 2023!

The diocesan process formed the backbone of the activities undertaken. On February 23rd, the PCC appointed the churchwardens as the two parish representatives to participate in the formal activities to appoint the new vicar. The hard graft of producing the profile, a document for potential candidates to understand what the parish is looking for as it seeks to serve God, its community and church, started with a listening exercise to identify who we at St Catherine's are and the direction we are headed.

A big thank you to all those who participated in this listening ensured that had we questionnaire representation of responses - over 50 church members and over 20 from church groups, church/hall hirers shops and schools in the area.

The responses were analysed at a parish meeting facilitated by Rhodri Bowen, the Diocesan Development Advisor in March, and this lead to the production of the profile – with some very significant effort! – which the PCC and the diocese approved on 6th May.

The post was then advertised following which the diocese and the two St Catherine's PCC representatives agreed to take forward one candidate, Jackie Fountain, to interview on 13th July.

The day went smoothly thanks to many of you helping in organising and participating in the interview activities (Bible study with 9 church members; talk including a group of Birch Copse Primary School pupils; parish tour and interview). The thrilling result was the appointment of Jackie as our new vicar.

Jackie completed her curacy at St Nicholas, Newbury, before she and her husband, Paul, moved into the vicarage a few weeks ahead of the induction and institution service. And what a service!

A huge amount of planning and preparation was required by so many as we hosted over 150 people at this service taken by the Bishop Olivia, Rev Liz Jackson and Rev Liz Ratcliffe – those involved included car park attendants, Bishop's Chaplain, those preparing and serving refreshments, readers, those providing tech support, furniture movers, presenters of the symbols and much more besides!

Be warned – it could just happen that we have similar numbers at our regular services! And so, we look forward in anticipation and excitement as to where God will now take us.

WORSHIP & OUR WORSHIPPING COMMUNITY

We have continued to enjoy worshipping together as one fellowship at 10.00am each Sunday, following the monthly pattern of 4 different styled services, guided by the Leaders and Preachers Action Group, with online streaming available for those who cannot join us in person.

We are aware that the service pattern is in need of review when Jackie Fountain can work together with us on this. Wednesday morning communion has continued with a committed group. Throughout the year we have been blessed with the support of local clergy providing us with such a rich variety of teaching.

Our Easter and Christmas services followed a similar pattern to previous

years, including a Family Activity Service on Good Friday and Carols Under the Oak Tree at Christmas – both attracting visitors into a more familiar space than our usual services.

Tots Praise has continued throughout the year on a weekly term time basis as well as the monthly York House communion. The Lifegroups, following their 2022 reorganisation, have continued to provide a much-valued opportunity for church members to share fellowship and to grow in faith.

We miss Beryl Nunn, who died in July, just before her 92nd birthday – a long standing, faithful member of the St Birinus and St Catherine's fellowship. And on a happier note, we welcomed the opportunity to celebrate Andrea Ragoobar and Matti Swallow's wedding in October!

CENTRE

We continue to be incredibly blessed by our centre, including the hall and café, which enable us to show God's love, share hospitality and make friendships with those both in and outside our worshipping community. All made possible by our hard-working volunteer team, centre manager, café manager and bookings clerk.

We said goodbye to Karen Patrick our café manager for over six years as she left us in July, wishing her all the best for the future. Due to the sterling efforts of the volunteers, the café remained open, albeit with a sometimes-reduced menu.

A new manager, Karen Fountaine, joined us in September, but unfortunately due to personal circumstances, she left us in early 2024. Despite all these challenges, the volunteers continue to provide a friendly service!

This time last year we were concerned about the potential adverse financial impact of the loss of the pre-school. God has been faithful, and He has helped us to achieve sufficient financial funds through the year, as our financial reports evidence.

ACTIVITIES

The activity groups organised by the church fellowship are a very important part of who we are. They are too numerous to list here and are detailed elsewhere in the APCM reports. Note that the Lifegroups, following their 2022 reorganisation, have continued to provide a much valued opportunity for church members to share fellowship and grow in faith. Pick'n'Mix sadly ended, as the group became unviable with the move away from Reading as some entered the next stage of their education.

COMMUNITY LINKS

Our links with Birch Copse School have continued. We were thrilled that a group from Birch Copse actively participated in our interview activities for our new vicar! As in 2022, they used our church for their Christmas 2023 7 services, and occasionally Birch Copse

have asked a church member to join them in a class discussion. The music group also enjoyed playing and singing carols at their very busy Christmas fair in December!

The Scouts organisation held their Christmas service at St Catherine's, and we also enjoyed their parade at our Coronation service.

We are looking to further strengthen and extend these community links going forward.

HAVING FUN

The opportunities to have fun are too numerous to provide anything here but a flavour!

The Coronation weekend brought two days of celebrating the Coronation of King Charles III. This culminated in having fun and games in sunshine in the church grounds on the Sunday afternoon. Impossible not to have fun with the following on offer: photos with the King and Queen, delicious homemade cakes, country dancing with our live band, treasure hunt, quizzes, children's activities and the afternoon rounded off with the unveiling of the beautifully crafted commemorative throne complete with Stone of Scone! Lots of laughter had by all!

A very enjoyable fund-raising Italian evening was held on St Catherine's Day, April 29th. The Italian theme was prevalent in the delicious 3 course menu provided by our Café Manager,

Buildings & Equipment

This group is responsible for making sure that everything in the Centre, i.e. the Church, Hall and narthex, works and is regularly serviced, and also for keeping an eye on our overall carbon footprint.

Following our five-yearly inspection (Quinquennial no 9) carried out last year, we have concentrated on how we might insulate the Sanctuary but have not so far found an economic solution. Most of the heat there goes straight up the "chimney" and it is not economic to insulate above the ring beam (about 3m high).

We continued to spend too much 8 money (over £3k) on our boilers. Our new maintenance contractor,

Advanced Maintenance Ltd (AML), proved to be expensive and unreliable so we reverted to the original boiler manufacturer, MHG, to adjust the control system by installing simpler thermostats in the church and hall.

With a lot of subsequent monitoring by Chris Addison, this appears to have done the trick and we finally think we know how the system works.

We finalised fixed-rate two-year contracts with Parish Buying for our supply of gas and electricity at approximately double the previous cost. Our electricity comes from renewable sources but our gas does

not and this poses a significant threat to our aim of being carbon neutral by 2030.

We continue to investigate renewable energy sources, such as solar power but the capital cost is significant and it is hard to see how we will be able to afford this.

All our day-to-day maintenance is designed to reduce our carbon footprint, e.g. replacing spent light bulbs with LED equivalents and minimising heating and lighting periods.

Other tasks undertaken this year include

- Roof repairs to the Hall,
- Tap replacement and macerator service in the accessible toilets,

- Glass repairs in the church and hall,
- Regular maintenance of the building, including fire safety equipment, emergency lighting, kitchen equipment and waste disposal
- Regular testing of the fire alarm system and emergency lighting.

As usual, we are blessed to have Chris Addison keeping an eye on things in and around the building and putting them right.

We are also grateful to Paddy Barrett, Roy Walklate and Stuart Poore for the weekly testing of the fire alarm system and emergency lighting, and to Peter Broomfield for all things electrical.

Again, four seasonal editions in full colour. Whilst I need to print at least 120 each time, there were fewer than 100 paid up subscribers in 2023. Of the remainder, some are given to newcomers and visitors and I'm happy that they can be used in this way.

The accounts will show that income from sales in 2023 was £620 and from advertisers £317 whereas the cost of production was £1,352.

This apparent disparity is due to the cost of leasing the printer; this is a fixed 9 charge but the lease is due for review

in 2024, the printer is beyond its designed life, and we will be researching for a replacement.

This is in addition to the supplier's charge per colour copy (ten times the cost of a Black & White copy) and of course the cost of the paper to print it.

Whist the magazine and APCM materials are normally the biggest printing jobs, there were the service sheets for Jackie's Induction in November.

Café Siena

Café Siena continues to provide a warm, welcoming space on Thursdays Fridays for everyone in the community. We have many regular customers whom we know well, as well who visit as customers iust occasionally. They all can enjoy freshly made drinks, home made cakes and during the lunch period hot snacks or a home-cooked meal.

The Book Club continues to meet monthly in the café as well as groups from both the Afternoon and Evening WI's. The Children's corner is also well used with mums and carers being able to enjoy a coffee whilst the little ones enjoy the toys and books on the carpet.

We continue to source much of our food through the Fare Share Scheme, a charity which provides employment opportunities for young people with additional needs but also works to reduce food poverty and food waste. We make every effort to minimise wastage in the café and compost and recycle as much as we can.

The Café could not operate without the willing help of all our volunteers, both from the church and the community. We are a very "mixed bunch" with different skills but together we make a friendly team - some are excellent with veg preparation and soup making, whilst others are a dab hand with making coffees, or cakes, not to mention the servers, money counters 10 lead us to appoint his chosen person. and cleaner uppers! Mustn't forget

those on the washing up and laundry rotas either. The Café Siena WhatsApp group has been very helpful in sending the rotas to everyone but also to appeal for anyone who can help when we are short staffed.

Karen joined us in September 2023 as Cafe Siena Manager, working to build on the Cafe's success. Karen, together the volunteers Steph Maureen, were undaunted when the Environment Health Officer visited unexpectedly to inspect the kitchen. They took her through our standard practices and we were again awarded a 5 star rating. A fantastic and well deserved achievement! Unfortunately Karen resigned in January 2024 due to personal circumstances. We wish her all the very best for the future.

We thank God for the ongoing work of our volunteers who are continuing to provide the cafe services that are so appreciated by our customers, albeit that these may sometimes of necessity be more limited, especially as in the next few months several volunteers will be taking extended breaks or holidays. We have been fortunate to have some young people helping for a day or two during school holidays and we hope this is something we can continue.

Recruitment for a new cafe manager is in progress and we pray that God will

It has again been another busy year in managing bookings for both the hall and church spaces. Breakfast Club now use the hall for three early morning sessions a week and after school meets four times a week.

We have regular weekly bookings from a variety of exercise groups, meeting during the day and in the evenings and also monthly bookings from the two WI's, Vivace Voices and the Trefoil Guild. Enquiries for children's party bookings are frequent and feedback from party bookers about our facilities has been very positive.

Eve Combes, our hall bookings manager, is doing a great job, fielding lots of enquiries and subsequent questions from hirers. She also sends out the necessary paperwork and issues the monthly calendars for both Church and Hall users.

Thanks also to Jean Almond who does all our invoicing and checks that all the payments are in order.

We continue to try and minimise our energy use, both for financial reasons and care for the planet. Chris Addison has worked hard to timetable the heating to suit the variety of bookings we have and monitors this regularly to ensure every group has a comfortable temperature when meeting.

In addition, a lot of research and time has gone into making our internet connection more reliable for live streaming our services.

St Catherine's Church and hall are busy spaces but so many different people also work hard to make this happenthe gardeners, the building and maintenance volunteers, volunteer cleaners and so many more. A great team!

Last years (2023) roll was 119, an increase of 12 over 2022. While I don't expect numbers to increase by that much for 2024, I am confident that our numbers will continue to slowly but surely increase for 2024.

Finance Action Group

The Finance Action Group exists to help and support the Treasurer with the financial running of the Church. The group met on four occasions in 2023, all of which took place in the church building. We start each meeting with an opening prayer before discussing both the current and the projected year end bank balances. During the year we also discuss the rates for both the hall rent and for advertising in the RG31 magazine, wage increases for the hall cleaner and the café manager, fund raising, the draft budget for the following year, the contents of the Annual Financial Report and of course any unexpected / unplanned expenses. In 2023 we also discussed how to cope with managing our banking when the local branch of the Nat West at the Triangle closed. We recommended that the PCC bought an online version of our Finance Computer package thus making it both possible to share the treasurer job if needed and for others

to view the financial data held. We also recommended that we open two new bank accounts which would enable the PCC to earn interest on any surplus funds. The Finance Action Group is unable to make decisions. It can only recommend a course of action to the PCC at their next meeting.

I would like to thank everyone who has helped in the Finance Action Group both this past year and over the previous twelve years, without this help and encouragement, I would not have been able to do the job.

Finally, I resigned from the job of treasurer to the PCC at the start of 2024 with Sean East taking over from me. The presentation of the 2023 Accounts at the APCM will be my last job as the old treasurer. I am sure that Sean will also receive support from everyone in his position as the new treasurer.

GDPR

GDPR (the General Data Protection Regulations) covers how we obtain (i.e. get consent), store and use individual's data (personal details).

When the regulation came into force, the Church of England provided specimen consent forms which I have adapted for our use. In every case written consent is given to communicate for some or all of the normal ways; post, telephone, or email. Any paperwork is held under lock and key.

At its simplest we have a small one-sided contact card for church members which allows me to email out the Notice Sheet each week. The data is stored in a password protected piece of software 'in the cloud' called ChurchSuite. This software is a powerful tool with many options, but has a cost depending on the number of names and options.

We currently only subscribe to the basic address list module, amongst other uses it generates labels for magazine subscribers. Additional

modules can cover production of rotas and service planning.

Some churches use the facility for individual church members to have access to their data and how it is used, e.g. availability on a rota, again there is a cost as well as necessary computer literacy of users.

A more detailed consent card is used for activities involving non-church members which in addition allows people to choose what it is that we can contact them about; the particular activity (e.g. Tots Praise, Cornwell 0-5s' or Holiday Club), any activity concerning families, or any church activity.

This data is stored on a password protected spreadsheet with currently over 400 names. This dates back to pre-ChurchSuite days and to migrate the data there would involve considerable difficulty and cost.

- Cleared weeds from some flower beds, and planted ground cover plants to inhibit weed growth.
- Dead headed and pruned the roses.
- Planted a few more plants and bulbs.
- Kept the corner bed on the North lawn looking beautiful.
- Kept the lawns well mown.
- Kept the car parks free from litter, leaves and weeds.
- Carried out necessary maintenance on the outside seating and tables.
- Used the buttress bed next to the door to the sanctuary again for an Easter Garden and a Nativity scene.
- Trimmed the perimeter and internal hedges and shrubs.
- Put up a splendid Christmas tree and lights.

We would like to: -

- Bring the circular bed on the South lawn into better shape, with little pathways between the shrubs for children to run through, so that it needs minimal maintenance.
- Improve the East facing buttress bed and replace the Pieris which died after the extreme temperatures and drought in summer 2022, and the deep frosts in the following winter.
- Improve the North East facing buttress which is extremely 15 overgrown.

- Replace one or two of the clematis growing on the fence at the back of the North lawn, which have died.
- Prune the Field Maple on the corner of the church hall and the South lawn, to keep it from damaging our neighbour's property and the church hall roof.
- Maintain and improve our eco church status by taking more care of all the wild life living in or visiting our church garden. Anyone with knowledge and enthusiasm in this field will be joyfully welcomed into our team!
- Keep the bird feeders on the silver birch on the South lawn outside the church hall clean and topped up.
- Manually remove all the thick stems in the perimeter and internal hedges, so that Darren will be able to bring the height of the hedge back to its original height when it is cut in the autumn.

To achieve these aims we would appreciate: -

- Prayers for existing gardeners, Hazel, Jo, Paddy, Richard Childs and Chris, to keep us as fit and able, so we can continue to work in the church grounds.
- Prayers for one or two more volunteers to share the work.
- Prayers to thank God for a willing apprentice who has offered to help Paddy with the lawn mowing.

Leaders & Preachers Action Group

The work of the Leaders & Preachers Action Group has had special focus during 2023 during the vacancy, organising services that assist us in worshipping and serving God, and help us to grow in our faith, to increase our love for one another and to grow God's kingdom here in Tilehurst.

The monthly cycle of 4 different types of services (Traditional Holy Communion, All Age Worship, Family Communion, Word & Worship and the opportunity to do something different on a 5th Sunday), based on templates that our previous vicar, Gill Rowell, helpfully left us with, continued.

Whilst this has acted as a firm foundation for us as a church in vacancy and gone some way to address the varied personal preferences of church members, the Leaders and Preachers Action Group have been very aware that a review is needed.

A number of factors need to be investigated, including:

- the complexity of the cycle,
- the slightly uncomfortable positioning of communion after the service on the 2nd and 4th Sunday,
- the ease with which newcomers can navigate the cycle,
- the extent to which it delivers St Catherine's approach to both embody the traditional service elements as well as encouraging a free response to God's love.

However, the Leaders and Preachers group determined to leave this review until it could be undertaken with our new vicar, Jackie Fountain.

We have been blessed through the year with support and encouragement from local clergy – no less than seventeen during the year! – who blessed us with a huge variety of styles, sharing with us a glimpse of God working through their lives and ministry.

Their support was so fantastic that there was not one Sunday in 2023 that we were without a member of clergy! Furthermore, there were only a few Wednesday services that were held as Morning Prayer rather than Holy Communion due to the lack of availability of a member of clergy.

We have a debt of gratitude to all the local clergy who supported us, including Alan Gates who almost exclusively presided over our Wednesday Holy Communion services and Liz Ratcliffe who responded so effectively to our cries for help when we struggled to find someone.

During July and August, we repeated the practise of recent years, and held our services outside to facilitate reaching those that do not normally attend church services.

Our Easter and Christmas services followed the pattern of previous years. It was thrilling to enjoy the buzz of an action-packed family service on Good Friday, attended by a number of local families.

Christmas was particularly busy, with a Monday Christmas Day bringing together both regular Sunday as well as Christmas services. However, we navigated through it, grateful for the leadership of our new vicar, Jackie Fountain, who by the time Christmas arrived had been in post barely a month!

The services included Carols under the Oak Tree which again was popular with local people.

Jackie Fountain's service of Institution, Induction and Installation as our new vicar on November 28th, attended by Bishop Olivia, Rev Liz Jackson, the Associate Archdeacon of Berkshire, Rev Liz Ratcliffe, Associate Area Dean of 17 Reading, as well as over 150 other

people, is without doubt one of the major highlights of the year!

The service was an inspiration and was the culmination of significant effort from very many of you – tech team, musicians, car park attendants, refreshment making and serving, furniture movers, readers as well as those playing a part in the service.

The church was overflowing – we look forward to the day when the church is buzzing with that number again!

We thank God for the LPAG members who have contributed so much during 2023, in the giving of their time, talents and energy.

Sadly, Richard Yates left the Leaders and Preachers Group, as he and Katrina focus on their lives in Bromley and we thank him for all he has done for us over the years and wish him well on his ongoing journey.

And a special mention must go to our youngest member, Aaron Devaney. It has been thrilling to learn and be challenged by Aaron as he has preached on a few occasions and shared with us a little of his personal journey with Christ. Well done and thank you Aaron!

- Liaising with visiting clergy and their required Sunday service material.
- Preparation of the Parish Profile, including interviewing the community.
- Handling the interview and appointment of our new Vicar -Jackie.
- Jackie's Induction Service including formal invitations and service booklet.
- Advertise and handle applications for the role of Café Manager.

All in all, a pretty busy 2023. Somehow, I don't think 2024 will be much quieter!

Reading Deanery Synod

March Meeting at St Barnabas Church, Emmer Green

Revd Mike Smith (Area Dean – Caversham, Thameside and Mapledurham) presented an update of the Reading Resource Hub saying that the Standing and Mission and Pastoral Committee of the Deanery (SMPC) had recommended to the Bishop of Reading the following priorities for 2023-2026:-

- · Green Park.
- The Town Centre where 6,000 accommodations are being made available.
- Loddon Reach where around 12,000 new residents are expected.

with the priority being Green Park.

Joan Walker (Reading Gateway) said that their PCC had obtained funding to employ another part-time Parish Nurse, Jill Anders.

Members split into area groups to discuss what is going well / not so well, new opportunities and resourcing.

Revd Mike Smith outlined the discussions arising from the draft publication of Prayers of Love and Faith by the House of Bishops and said PCCs will need to find appropriate ways to determine whether they are used in parishes.

June Meeting at Reading Gateway St Agnes Church, South Reading

Sue Mott (Associate Lay Chair Central – 23 Laity.

St Giles) led a discussion on where we have seen God at work in our churches.

The revised Parish Share Committee (PSC) terms of reference were approved.

Mark Burton (Lay Chair & Treasurer, St Barnabas) presented the principles and process of the draft scheme for allocating the 2024 Parish Share and the 3% increase draft 2024 Parish Share, which would meet the Deanery's current commitments excluding funding for Green Park.

Voting was as follows -

that this Synod:

- a) agrees the Parish Share Principles for 2024.
- b) agrees the 2024 draft Parish Share proposals,
- c) agrees that a 6% increase, on average, in Parish Share is not affordable for parishes to fund new ministry in Green Park,
- d) invites the Deanery Leadership Team to bring forward alternative funding options for Green Park ministry.

September Meeting at Earley St Peter Church Hall

As this was the first synod meeting of the 2023-2026 Triennium, the Area Dean oversaw the re-election of Mark Burton as Lay Chair by the House of Laity.

Cornwell 0-5s

This toddler group has been running 32 years and pre-dates for over of Cornwell Community formation Church.

We thought that its future was assured when, in 2019, it was in danger of closing and St Catherine's took it over. In terms of number attending and 'profitability' it is a success.

The accounts will show that in 2023 income at £3.50 per session for family groups or childminders was £3,376 and costs (rent of Cornwell Centre and refreshments) was only £2,435; a substantial contribution to church finances.

In addition, we have reserves of £1,069 remaining of the 'dowry' given to the church along with all the toys and equipment when the charity was wound up.

There is a 'BUT' and that is the ageing pool of volunteers that run the two sessions each week, spending 30 minutes setting up; moving chairs and tables along with about half the contents of our four cupboards, then admin; registration, GDPR, there's serving refreshments, buying & washing up, then clearing it all away after the two-hour session.

That all gets in the way of what we think is the most important thing we can do, and that is to show our care make the sessions warm and welcoming places. Not only talking to those attending but listening.

Before each session we pray and the singing time includes several Christian/ Bible songs, the children like it when Tony is there to play guitar.

The Tuesday session is for family groups (we allow up to 25); Mothers, Fathers, Grandparents with one or two children each.

At 'Snack time' there's tea, coffee, and good quality biscuits, we provide 'healthy snacks' - predominately fruit. for the children. Doreen Farmer and Liz Gulley will have prepared craft and Liz oversees.

Caroline O'Sullivan will have bought, prepared, and serves refreshments, Evelyn & Tony Bartlett & Stuart Poore set up, do registration, and try to chat to those attending.

At the end of the session there's washing up to do. If Stuart or Evelyn & Tony are away Hilary Smee is usually able to cover.

With children moving on to Nursery or school by age 4, there's quite a turnover of the families attending, but it's always good when mum returns with a new baby.

The Thursday session childminders (we allow up to 15 but each will have up to 4 children) and it's and friendship and the love of God to 28a fairly stable group. Whilst they bring (Continued on page 29)

their own 'snacks' there is a considerable amount of washing up with over 40 children attending.

Running the session will be Tony, Evelyn, Stuart and either Doreen or Lynn Stevens. If Tony & Evelyn are away Caroline O'Sullivan can cover, but that leaves us with the minimum of 3 with a huge amount to do.

The childminders are appreciative of all we do for them and very generous with their Christmas gifts to us.

Our dilemma is that the group has a good reputation, is filling a clear need, and is in demand (attendance is by prior booking through 'Eventbrite' and we are often fully booked). We need more helpers, particularly when one of the team is away, if only to do the washing up.

Would moving the group to St Catherine's gain more helpers? That's a question we are asking and praying about for 2024.

Green Team

2023's climate was the warmest on record, with record low Antarctic ice, record sea surface temperatures and levels, increasing greenhouse gas levels, and extreme flooding impacting our UK communities. The optimum way to increase our awareness at St Catherine's of climate change and the need for each one of us, individually and corporately, to take action is still being sought.

Initiatives included publishing suggested actions for each one of us in the weekly notice sheets which were summarised in the Spring RG31 edition (do look again if you still have that copy and take one more action!), advertising local and diocesan talks on the challenge and taking part in the 2023 RSPB bird survey.

As we journey through 2024, lets all pray with listening ears as to the actions we will take so that the aspiration in Psalm 96 can be realised: Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice; let the sea roar, and all that fills it; let the field exult, and everything in it. Tot's Praise

In 2023 the story was read by either Anna, Hilary or Sonia and the craft sessions led by Doreen or Joanne. We try to have 3 helpers at each session though we do occasionally have only 2.

From September our numbers were stretched as Anna stopped helping at Tots because both of her girls are now at primary school, however Anna still finds time to pop in to help set up after dropping them both off at school, for which we are very grateful.

Evelyn started coming once a month to offer support and Joanne started to read the story. Then at the end of November Joanne had to stop doing everything for a couple of months. Fortunately, Doreen took over all the craft work and Jackie joined us. Despite this we would really appreciate some extra help to lighten the load.

We never know which children will turn up or how many or how old. It is great fun and rewarding as you get to know the children and their carers.
